

OHIO WRITING PROJECT

Why

 Through formal assessments, we found that writing is an area of weakness for Little Miami students.

Goal

- All staff will understand the importance of writing and how to implement writing in their content area.
- Students will have focused writing opportunities daily across content areas to express their knowledge and/ or ideas.

Why OWP

 OWP is not a system, but writing strategies to use in classrooms. Teachers attend workshops particular to their grade band and content area.

How

- Three-year implementation
 - 2015-16 (Grades 5-8)
 - 2016-17 (Grades K-4)
 - 2017-18 (Grades 9-12)

TEACHER PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

Each year two in-service days and four 90-minute delays are scheduled where students do not attend school so teachers can attend professional development sessions

Each summer, many LM teachers attend professional development sessions






Jack German State Qualifier 100-yd & 50-yd Freestyle

DISTRICT FINANCES

Terry Gonda Treasurer

- Five-year levy passed in November 2011
- Release from fiscal emergency (May 22, 2013)
- \$11 million Solvency Assistance Loan paid off (June 30, 2014)



- Top 20% in all Ohio districts in student achievement, but in bottom third for per-pupil spending
- Clean audits since release from fiscal emergency
 - Regular fiscal audits by Ohio Auditor's office (FY 2012, 2013, 2014)
- Government Finance Officers Association award for the Comprehensive Annual Financial Report (CAFR) www.LittleMiamiSchools.com/departments/treasurer

- Enrollment at all-time high (4,478 as of 9/2)
- Gaining 200 students per year
- LM receives state funding per student, but we are nearing the "cap"
- Growth outpacing revenue
- State mandates

Business Advisory Council analysis:

- Short-term: Levy renewal in November 2015
- Long-term: Increasing funding needs over next 15 years

Little Miami's challenges:

- Flat to modest growth in total revenues (~1%)
- Continuing growth in enrollment, personnel costs/insurance exceeding revenue growth (~6%)
- Intervention on both revenue and spending plans critical

Business Advisory Council recommendations:

- Five-year renewal on Nov. 3 ballot (Issue 7)
 - 13.86 mills generates \$10.6 million per year
 - Zero tax increase
- Restrain growth in expenditures
- Investigate alternative funding (earnings tax)
