ABOUT LITTLE MIAMI

The Little Miami Local School District encompasses 98 square miles of rural and suburban areas and includes the communities of Morrow, Maineville, Butlerville, Hamilton Township, Harlan Township and Salem Township.

Little Miami has grown to serve more than 5,864 students with 5,642 students in classrooms throughout our five buildings, 135 attending joint vocation school programs and 95 additional students placed in settings best suited to meet their needs. The district prides itself on child-centered decision-making, service to the whole child and opportunities for all students to achieve their goals and dreams.

Little Miami is the place to be! Since August of 2024, Little Miami enrolled 989 new students. Of these new Panthers, 65 students enrolled from 16 different states and another 34 students from 14 different countries. In total, Little Miami currently has students enrolled from 47 different countries.

ACADEMICS - GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

Ohio changed its graduation requirements in 2023. The new requirements provide more flexibility to choose a graduation pathway that builds on the strengths and passions of each student. This will help ensure that students are ready for their next steps and excited about their future.

First, students must cover the basics. Students must earn at least 20 credits in specified subjects and take the state-required tests.

Students must also receive economics and financial literacy instruction and complete at least two semesters of fine arts courses.

Second, students must show competency by earning a passing score on Ohio's high school Algebra I and English II tests. Students who do not pass a test will be offered additional support and must retake the test at least once. If testing is not a strength, students may also choose one of the below options to meet the criteria.

1. Demonstrate Two Career-Focused Activities:
 - a. Foundational: proficient scores on WebXams, a 12-point industry credential, or pre-apprenticeship or acceptance into apprenticeship program.
 - b. Supporting: work-based learning, earn the required score on WorkKeys or earn the OhioMeansJobs Readiness Seal.

2. Enlist in the military: students must provide evidence of a signed contract to enter a branch of the U.S. armed services upon graduation.
3. Complete college coursework: students must earn credit for one college-level math and/or college-level English course through Ohio's free College Credit Plus Program.

Third, students must show readiness by earning two diploma seals, one of which must be Ohio designed.

Special Education - Work Study Opportunities

- Practical Assessment Exploration System (PAES) prepares students for the transition to life after high school.

ACADEMICS - OPPORTUNITIES

WCCC Partnership

Little Miami and the Warren County Career Center are teamed up for your student's success! Students who attend WCCC during their junior and senior years of high school are equipped with skills and training to prepare them for future careers. Students are also given opportunities to continue taking challenging academic courses while they train for a career path they will love. Students spend half of their day in a career lab (similar to a major in college) gaining hands-on skill experience with the equipment used in that particular career field. The other half of the day, students take academic classes at WCCC to earn the credits necessary for graduation.



Whether attending WCCC's Main or Atrium Campus, students are still connected to Little Miami! Industry credentials and certifications are earned at WCCC, but the student's high school diploma comes from Little Miami. WCCC works directly with LMHS counselors to ensure students take the classes needed to earn graduation credits. This truly is the best of both worlds. Students remain connected to LM and can still participate in athletics, LMHS graduation, prom, homecoming, senior fun days, plays and after-school clubs.



Over 60% of students attending the WCCC attend college upon graduation!

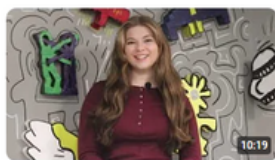

Earn College Credit Before High School Graduation

All incoming 7-12 graders are eligible to participate in the College Credit Plus (CCP) program if they meet grade and testing requirements for college admission into CCP programs. This opportunity gives students the opportunity to earn high school and college credit simultaneously!



LMHS earned the prestigious **2022 College Success Award** from GreatSchools.org for excellence in preparing students for college and beyond. LMHS has secured this award for five consecutive years.

State of District Finances

The Little Miami Treasurer's Department has remained dedicated to responsible financial stewardship, providing the necessary support to students and staff to learn, adjust and grow.

Since Fiscal Year, 2015 to our most recent completed school year, FY24, the district has seen an average increase of 162 students per year (3.38%). This has resulted in an increase of 1,456 students over this time period to a total enrollment of 5,765 (FY24).

Despite the significant student growth LM has seen over the years we have strategically stretched out the funds generated from the passage of the 2011 Emergency Levy of \$10.6 million for more than thirteen years! These funds represent approximately 18% of LM's total operating budget and are vital to the district's financial health. We are so thankful to the community for investing in the future of our students!

With careful planning and monitoring of the district's increasing growth in enrollment, the Board and LM administration will continue to provide the best opportunities available to our students in the most economical ways possible.

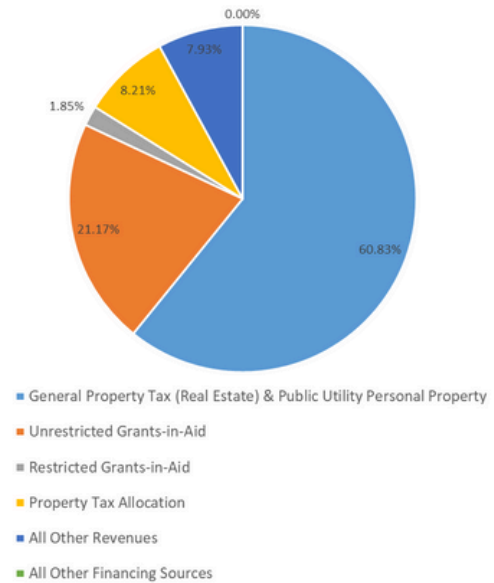

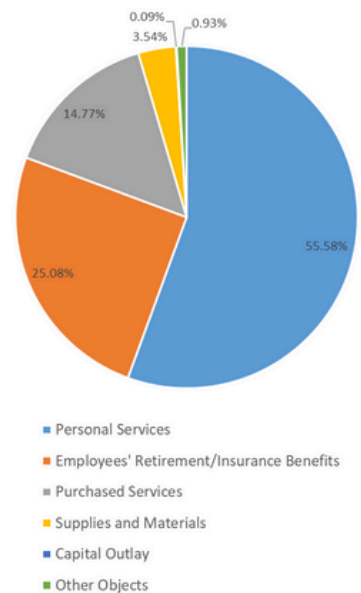

MUSIC EDUCATION AT LITTLE MIAMI

Introducing students to instruments in their early years and making musical training FUN are important elements to maintaining the quality of the Little Miami music programs for years to come! LM offers Music as a "Special" in Grades 1-5, with Choir and Band classes beginning as an Elective course in Grade 6.

Throughout their musical education journey, young Panthers learn about different elements of music, learn to read music, have the opportunity to compose their own classroom rhythmic exercises, and learn instrument-playing basics, so they are ready to take their talents to the next level in middle school and high school.

FOCUS ON FINE ARTS

Little Miami High School Choir

Last year's theme was "The Journey Home," and it truly reflected the experiences of the Little Miami Select Choirs. These seniors began their high school journey as freshmen during the COVID-19 pandemic. That year, classes were held outdoors until the weather turned and managed to perform in only one concert. Throughout their time at LMHS, these freshmen persevered, and now they have much to show for their four-year journey. This year, all singers in the LMHS Choirs presented four concerts for our school and community members.

The year kicked off with the national event, Walk with Amal, held downtown around the National Underground Railroad Freedom Center. The Little Miami Select Choirs performed alongside the Cincinnati Chamber Orchestra, both there and later in Hyde Park.

LMHS Choir was invited for the third time in our history to the University of Cincinnati-Conservatory of Music's Feast of Carols, a tradition that began in 1867. The LMSC also traveled to Chicago for our annual spring educational tour, visiting landmarks like the Museum of Science and Industry and Shedd Aquarium, with performances at the Field Museum and Vandercook College of Music.

Second semester, students worked with five guest conductors, while some members participated in the District 13 Honor Choir and the OCDA Honor Choir. The LM Chorale achieved a Superior rating at the OMEA State Adjudicated Event for the 18th time in its twenty-year history. The Select Mixed Choir also earned a Superior rating at the OMEA State Adjudicated Event, marking the 15th time in its seventeen years as an established ensemble.

Art classes for LM students begin in 2nd grade and continue as a "Special" through 6th grade. In 7th and 8th grade, students are able to choose Art as an Elective course, while LMHS students have many opportunities to explore artistic endeavors in even more creative ways!

LMHS Art courses include: Ceramics, Advanced Ceramics, Painting, Advanced Painting, Sculpture Art Fundamentals, Advanced Drawing, Portfolio Preparation, Photography, Digital Media Arts. In these courses, students learn art history, careers in art, critiquing artwork, and how to produce art through exploring various mediums and techniques.

All students in grades 6-12 utilize a device, enabling them to access learning materials digitally and practice responsible device ownership. Kindergarten through 5th grade students use classroom devices on carts when lessons warrant digital resources.

We maintain a forward-thinking approach and regularly assess emerging technologies. We understand that in the K-12 sector, innovation often involves technological solutions that enhance core processes. To this end, we have incorporated a new software solution that enables us to better manage digital instructional applications. As a result, we have improved our instructional decision-making and are better equipped to meet the needs of our students.

The Food Services Department is a completely self-funded program that does not take any financial resources from the Little Miami General Fund.

Families are able to apply for Free and Reduced meals at [LittleMiamiSchools.com](https://www.littlemiamischools.com). Any students on the reduced meal plan will not be charged as the state of Ohio picks up the cost.

What's in a Meal?

Lunch consists of protein, grain, fruit, vegetables and milk. For lunch, students must take at least three components, with one being a fruit or vegetable. Breakfast must consist of fruit, milk and grain and may include protein and vegetables.

The Little Miami School District is committed to providing the best education for our students. One such pillar of excellence is an efficient transportation department. Every school district in Ohio receives an efficiency ratio. A score of 1.0 is deemed average and a score of 1.5 is considered exceptional.

While it is certainly challenging to transport more students than ever before, LM Transportation has learned to adapt and be flexible with routes, to help ensure students are safely transported to and from school in a reasonable time frame.

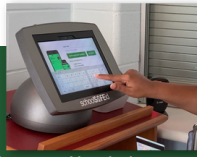
The safety and security of our Panthers will always be our top priority. As such, Little Miami continues to make safety improvements and updates for the 2023-24 school year.

SchoolSafeID Console

Visitor Management System Implemented in Each Building

Upon entering the Main Entrance of any building, all visitors and volunteers must scan a valid driver's license or a current government-issued identification. Using the ID card information, the SchoolSafeID system does an immediate background check to detect any issues that may prohibit further entrance into our buildings.

After following the quick steps on the touch-screen kiosk, and receiving approval for building admittance, a badge with visitor information, picture, and purpose for entry will be printed for the visitor to wear while in our buildings.

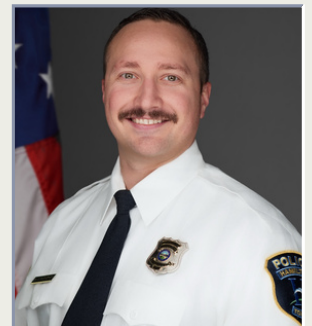

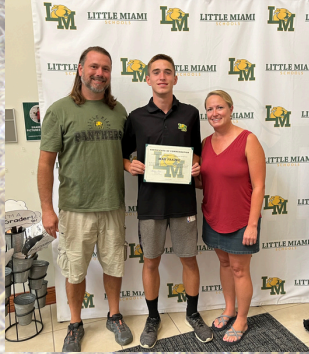
The gatherings feature workshops, seminars and panel discussions with experts in the fields of law enforcement, education, psychology and crisis management.

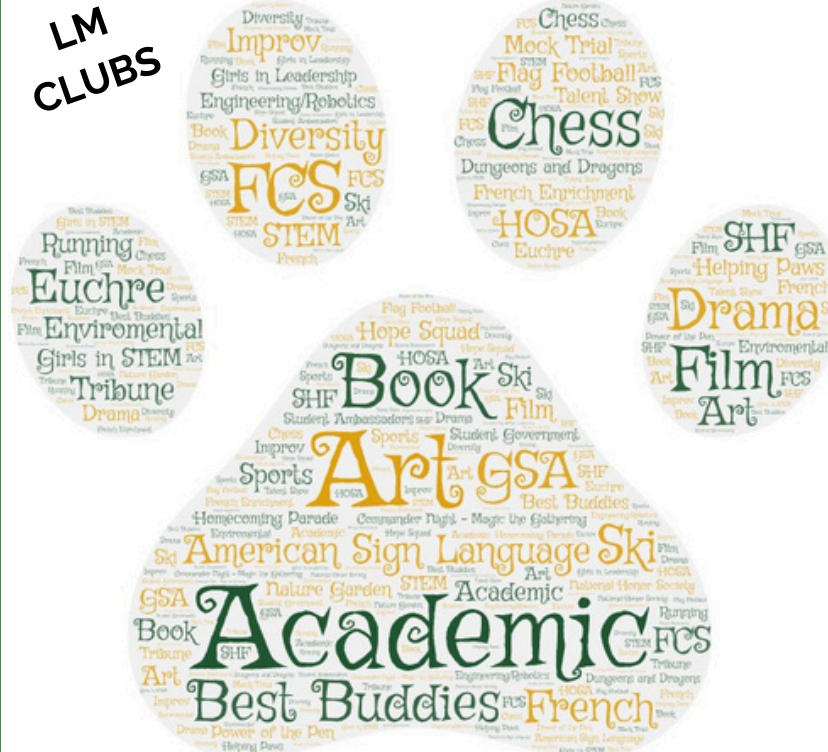

The LMHS Academic Team continues to prove to be a powerful force in the ECC. Since the 2021-2022 season, the LMHS Varsity Team has posted two undefeated seasons. Before joining the ECC, the Academic Team won 6 Southwest Ohio Conference Championships and 4 Fort Ancient Valley Conference titles.

The academic team had a historic 2023-24 season. The team finished 4th at the OAC State Tournament, the best finish in program history. The team went 7-5 at Nationals, ranking 77th in the nation!

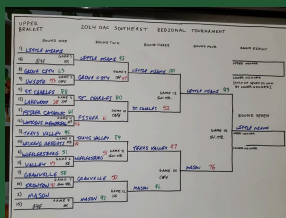

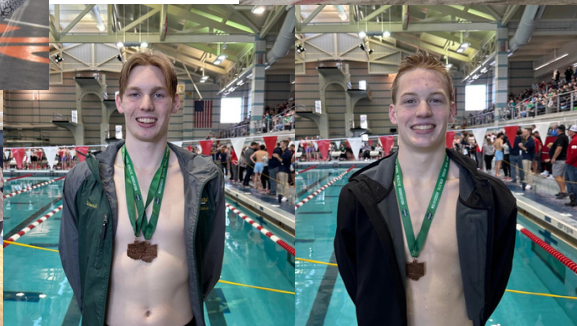

ADDRESSING MENTAL HEALTH NEEDS



At Little Miami, we are focused on supporting the mental health and wellness of our students and have provided extensive resources to help our students with their emotional needs. By addressing the needs of the "whole child," our Panthers are able to be safe, happy and more attentive in the classroom.

LMMS & LMHS Students Join the Hope Squad Mission



Both LMMS and LMHS are Hope Squad partner schools that are on a mission to reduce youth suicide through education, training and peer intervention. This peer-to-peer suicide prevention program teaches student members to identify at-risk students, provide friendship and seek help from an adult. They learn to show empathy, listen without judgment and reduce stigma regarding treatment and mental illness.



Core Essentials

The character education program for grades K-12 focuses on one core value a month. Students learn how to "Say It", "Know It", "Be It" and "See It" Students can be nominated by their classroom teachers for demonstrating the core value that month and are rewarded by having their names on the announcements and can receive a certificate.



RECO

RECO is a character education program for students in grades 6-12. RECO Ambassadors represent LM by having positive character and willingness to help. Members make school a more positive place for students and staff by planning events, spirit weeks and taking field trips to LM schools to spread positive messages.

Utilizing Peer-to-Peer Support

At LMHS, in addition to regular one-on-one counseling sessions, counselors have planned monthly lessons and school-wide activities to engage students. Student Ambassadors have also taken on the responsibility of creating and hosting events for new Panther students – including "meet ups," building tours and other fun events to raise student morale.

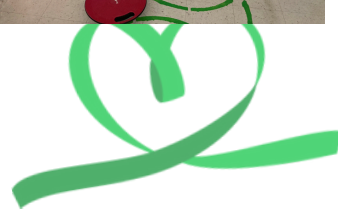
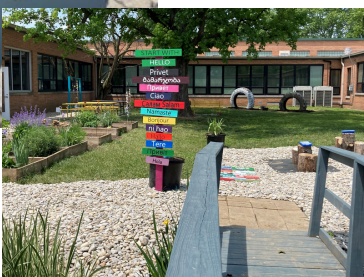

ADDRESSING MENTAL HEALTH NEEDS

Tier 1 Mental Health Supports

School Counselors support the emotional needs of students as they relate to academics. LM counselors run support groups, meet with students individually, monitor student 504 accommodation plans, create student schedules, assist with college and career planning, and connect families with needed resources. School counselors act as our 'front line of support' when our students are in crisis.

Tier 2 Mental Health Supports

Mental Health Consultants- Little Miami has four mental health consultants who are the central point of contact for all mental health services, as referred by the district for "triage." In cooperation with families, the LM Mental Health Consultants assess and determine appropriate services for each student referred by the school counselor. These specialists also fulfill the following critical roles:

- Provide mental health consultation to others served by the district.
- Provide district-wide crisis intervention services and monitor the students with the highest level of needs and severity of symptoms.
- Complete individual therapy referrals for students requiring a treatment plan with our partner agency.
- Provide consultation and professional development to staff to improve the support and management of students with mental health concerns in the academic environment.

School-Based Prevention Services - Prevention services are designed to promote positive mental health, identify psychological and social problems early, and reduce the risk factors associated with school failure. Prevention services are often short-term and provided to a targeted group of students for a specific concern. During the group, a referral for more intensive services may be indicated and brought to the attention of a mental health consultant for appropriate placement. Examples of these groups include: "Cancer Family Care," "Changing Families" and "Anxiety Management."

Tier 3 Mental Health Supports

Case Management Services are implemented as an ongoing individualized service with greater frequency, intensity and duration than prevention services. Case management services require greater participation from the family and involve the diagnosis of a mental health disorder. Little Miami works with Beech Acres to serve these student needs. Students will work with a case manager to reinforce coping skills and strategies they are learning in therapy to manage their symptoms and the daily challenges they face.

Mental Health School-based Therapist - Provides individual therapy services to students on a case-by-case basis with a mental health consultant. Mental health therapy services are the district's most intensive ongoing MH service. Therapy services along with family partnerships help lead to the diagnosis of a mental health disorder and require developing a treatment plan. Therefore, these services are much more individualized and occur at a deeper level than other services.

Little Miami utilizes the services and specialty of Beech Acres for students referred by counselors or mental health consultants who feel a more severe mental health diagnosis would benefit from increased care and a more long-term treatment for students. All services are paid for by private family insurance or Warren County mental health funds.



COMMITMENT TO COMMUNITY

It is the Little Miami way to help foster a sense of service and generosity in our students. To help cement this community-focused mentality, 12 hours of community service is required of all Seniors to graduate from LMHS. We are proud to share just a few ways students connect to their local community.

PURPLE STAR DESIGNATION

Since 2020, all school buildings within the Little Miami Local School District are recognized as Purple Star Designated Schools for their commitment to serving students and families connected to the United States armed forces.

Among the requirements a school must meet to receive the Purple Star Award is designating a liaison between military families in the district to ensure the families and students in the classrooms receive the special consideration they deserve.

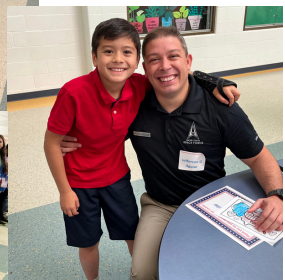

COMMITMENT TO COMMUNITY: SPOTLIGHT ON AIR FORCE JROTC

A unique feature of the LMHS and LMMS community is the presence of the Air Force Junior Reserve Officers' Training Corps (AF JROTC) on our campuses. The AFJROTC mission is "Developing Citizens of Character" and every aspect of their program is geared toward making better citizens for tomorrow. JROTC students take on added responsibilities and tasks to learn leadership, planning, and service at an entirely different level. Little Miami is proud to have offered this program to LM students since 2017.

PROGRAM IMPACT

When polling Seniors in the JROTC program to reflect on their time as cadets, they offered great insight into just how the program has impacted their character development.

Seniors described their younger selves as shy, lacking confidence and even doubtful of their capabilities. They say that after joining the program, they were encouraged to come out of their shell and flourish in their leadership skills, even running classes and cadet units.

WHY JOIN AF JROTC?

"We are a family," was a sentiment that seemed to resonate from a group of AF JROTC Seniors as they spoke on their years in the program. For those students on the fence about joining, Senior cadets encourage you to go for it! This commitment is fun, empowering, and not at all intimidating!

WHO WE ARE

This program, while supervised and guided by Lt. Col. Peterson and Chief Master Sergeant Becky Hale, is a cadet-run program.

During the 2024-25 school year, **138** cadets have chosen to participate in AF JROTC. **50** of those are 8th graders.



REQUIREMENTS & GRADUATION SEAL

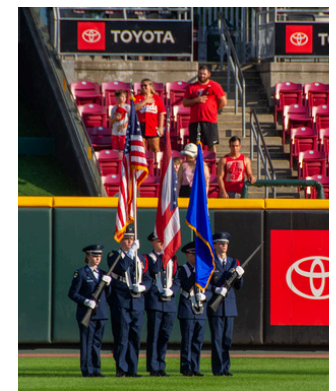
Cadets must complete at least 2.5 hours of community service every quarter, wear a uniform on Wednesdays, dress and participate in physical fitness, and adhere to specific grooming standards when in uniform. You may have seen the Little Miami AF JROTC cadets presenting the flags at the YMCA on Veterans Day, during LM sporting events or even a Reds game.

Cadets earn a seal for their diplomas upon graduation. If students enlist in the military after completing 3-4 years of AFJROTC, they will rank higher than entry-level cadets.

While this program uses a military model in the classroom, it is not utilized for military recruiting. There is no military requirement by participating in the AF JROTC program. In fact, only 3% of graduates choose to continue into the service upon graduating.

Fall 2024- After an extensive evaluation conducted by Region 6.3 Director for Headquarters Air Force JROTC, the LM unit earned the overall unit assessment score of 98.5% They will be submitted for Outstanding Unit consideration, an award which is given at the end of the school year.
