

ABOUT LITTLE MIAMI

The Little Miami Local School District encompasses 98 square miles of rural and suburban areas and includes the communities of Morrow, Maineville, Butlerville, Hamilton Township, Harlan Township and Salem Township.

Little Miami has grown to serve more than 5,723 students with 5,491 students in classrooms throughout our five buildings, 126 attending joint vocation school programs and 88 additional students placed in settings best suited to meet their needs. The district prides itself on child-centered decision-making, service to the whole child and opportunities for all students to achieve their goals and dreams.

Little Miami is the place to be! Since January of 2023, Little Miami enrolled 743 new students. Of these new Panthers, 48 students enrolled from 16 different states and another 14 students from 8 different countries. In total, Little Miami currently has students enrolled from 45 different countries.

ACADEMICS - GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

Ohio changed its graduation requirements in 2023. The new requirements provide more flexibility to choose a graduation pathway that builds on the strengths and passions of each student. This will help ensure that students are ready for their next steps and excited about their future.

First, **students must cover the basics**. Students must earn at least 20 credits in specified subjects and take the state-required tests.

Students must also receive economics and financial literacy instruction and complete at least two semesters of fine arts courses.

Second, students must show competency

by earning a passing score on Ohio's high school Algebra I and English II tests. Students who do not pass a test will be offered additional support and must retake the test at least once. If testing is not a strength, students may also choose one of the below options to meet the criteria.

- Demonstrate Two Career-Focused Activities:

 a. Foundational: proficient scores on
 WebXams, a 12-point industry credential,
 or pre-apprenticeship or acceptance into apprenticeship program.
 - b. Supporting: work-based learning, earn the required score on WorkKeys or earn the OhioMeansJobs Readiness Seal
- 2. Enlist in the military: students must provide evidence of a signed contract to enter a branch of the U.S. armed services upon graduation.
- 3. Complete college coursework: students must earn credit for one college-level math and/or college-level English course through Ohio's free College Credit Plus Program.

Third, students must show readiness by earning two diploma seals, one of which

must be Ohio designed.

WCCC Partnership

Little Miami and the Warren County Career Center are teamed up for your student's success! Students who attend WCCC during their junior and senior years of high school are equipped with skills and training to prepare them for future careers. Students are also given opportunities to continue taking challenging academic courses while they train for a career path they will love. Students spend half of their day in a career lab (similar to a major in college) gaining hands-on skill experience with the equipment used in that particular career field. The other half of the day, students take academic classes at WCCC to earn the credits necessary for graduation.

Whether attending WCCC's Main or Atrium Campus, students are still connected to Little Miami! Industry credentials and certifications are earned at WCCC, but the student's high school diploma comes from Little Miami. WCCC works directly with LMHS counselors to ensure students take the classes needed to earn graduation credits. This truly is the best of both worlds. Students remain connected to LM and can still participate in athletics, LMHS graduation, prom, homecoming, senior fun days, plays and after-school clubs.

Throughout their musical education journey, young Panthers learn about different elements of music, learn to read music, have the opportunity to compose their own classroom rhythmic exercises, and learn instrument-playing basics, so they are ready to take their talents to the next level in middle school and high school.

Although a waiver that provided all meals FREE of charge to students ended in June 2022, families are able to apply for Free and Reduced meals at LittleMiamiSchools.com.



What's in a Meal?

Lunch consists of protein, grain, fruit, vegetables and milk. For lunch, students must take at least three components, with one being a fruit or vegetable. Breakfast must consist of fruit, milk and grain and may include protein and vegetables.

During the 2022-2023 school year, 109,959 breakfast and 387,162 lunch meals were served.

Visitor Management System Implemented in Each Building

Upon entering the Main Entrance of any building, all visitors and volunteers must scan a valid driver's license or a current government-issued identification. Using the ID card information, the SchoolSafeID system does an immediate background check to detect any issues that may prohibit further entrance into our buildings.

After following the guick steps on the touch-screen kiosk, and receiving approval for building admittance, a badge with visitor information, picture, and purpose for entry will be printed for the visitor to wear while in our buildings.

Safety Council

In 2022 Little Miami formally established a Safety Council. The group of LM administrators and public safety professionals met to discuss safety measures, make decisions and implement procedures to improve the overall security of our students and staff at Little Miami.

This Safety Council meets on a quarterly basis to review current safety procedures & actions taken during crisis incidents, discuss future needs and strengthen working relationships before an emergency strikes.



Through these events we are able to share knowledge and build strong networks of relationships in our mission to prioritize safety and well being.

ADDRESSING MENTAL HEALTH NEEDS

At Little Miami, we are focused on supporting the mental health and wellness of our students and have provided extensive resources to help our students with their emotional needs. By addressing the needs of the "whole child," our Panthers are able to be safe, happy and more attentive in the classroom.

LMMS & LMHS Students Join the Hope Squad Mission



Both LMMS and LMHS are Hope Squad partner schools that are on a mission to reduce youth suicide through education, training and peer intervention. This peer-to-peer suicide prevention program teaches student members to identify at-risk students, provide friendship and seek help from an adult. They learn to show empathy, listen without judgment and reduce stigma regarding treatment and mental illness.

Core Essentials

The character education program for grades K-12 focuses on one core value a month. Students learn how to "Say It", "Know It", "Be It" and "See It" Students can be nominated by their classroom teachers for demonstrating the core value that month and are rewarded by having their names on the announcements and can receive a certificate.

RECO

RECO is a character education program for students in grades 6-12. RECO Ambassadors represent LM by having positive character and willingness to help. Members make school a more positive place for students and staff by planning events, spirit weeks and taking field trips to LM schools to spread positive messages.

Utilizing Peer-to-Peer Support

At LMHS, in addition to regular one-on-one counseling sessions, counselors have planned monthly lessons and school-wide activities to engage students. Student Ambassadors have also taken on the responsibility of creating and hosting events for new Panther students - including "meet ups," building tours and other fun events to raise student morale.

During the 2022-2023 school year, RECO raised money for the Morrow Food Pantry, organized SRO appreciation week, helped Remi complete therapy dog training and collected snacks for teachers.

LMES Sensory Spaces Enhance Learning Environment

A Sensory Courtyard and Room have been created for students to learn, destress, and enjoy a calming time. The LMES courtyard has been transformed into a space for outdoor



ADDRESSING MENTAL HEALTH NEEDS

Tier 1 Mental Health Supports

School Counselors support the emotional needs of students as they relate to academics. LM counselors run support groups, meet with students individually, monitor student 504 accommodation plans, create student schedules, assist with college and career planning, and connect families with needed resources. School counselors act as our 'front line of support' when our students are in crisis.



Tier 2 Mental Health Supports

Mental Health Consultants- Little Miami has four mental health consultants who are the central point of contact for all mental health services, as referred by the district for "triage." The LM Mental Health Consultants assess and determine appropriate services for each student referred by the school counselor. These specialists also fulfill the following critical roles:

- Provide mental health consultation to others served by the district.
- Provide district-wide crisis intervention services and monitor the students with the highest level of needs and severity of symptoms.
- Complete individual therapy referrals for students requiring a treatment plan with our partner agency.
- Provide consultation and professional development to staff to improve the support and management of students with mental health concerns in the academic environment.

School-Based Prevention Services - Prevention services are designed to promote positive mental health, identify psychological and social problems early, and reduce the risk factors associated with school failure. Prevention services are often short-term and provided to a targeted group of students for a specific concern. During the group, a referral for more intensive services may be indicated and brought to the attention of a mental health consultant for appropriate placement. Examples of these groups include: "Cancer Family Care," "Changing Families" and "Anxiety Management."

Tier 3 Mental Health Supports

Case Management Services are implemented as an ongoing individualized service with greater frequency, intensity and duration than prevention services. Case management services require greater participation from the family and involve the diagnosis of a mental health disorder. Little Miami works with Beech Acres to serve these student needs. Students will work with a case manager to reinforce coping skills and strategies they are learning in therapy to manage their symptoms and the daily challenges they face.

Mental Health School-based Therapist - Provides individual therapy services to students on a case-by-case basis with a mental health consultant. Mental health therapy services are the district's most intensive ongoing MH service. Therapy services require greater participation from the family, lead to the diagnosis of a mental health disorder and require developing a treatment plan. Therefore, these services are much more individualized and occur at a deeper level than other services.

Little Miami utilizes the services and specialty of Beech Acres for students referred by counselors or mental health consultants who feel a more severe mental health diagnosis would benefit from increased care and a more long-term treatment for students. All services are paid for by private family insurance or Warren County mental health funds.

State of District Finances



The Little Miami Treasurer's Department has remained dedicated to responsible financial stewardship, providing the necessary support to students and staff to learn, adjust and grow.

Ohio public school districts are required by law to prepare a five-year forecast of projected expenditures & revenues twice a year. As reported in the May 2023 Five Year Projection, a revenue shortfall is expected in FY2024.


Revenue FY23: \$55,156,332.00



Despite the significant student growth LM has seen over a decade plus, we have strategically stretched out the funds generated from the passage of the 2011 Emergency Levy for more than ten years! With the passage of Issue 12 in November 2020, which renewed the funding structure from the 2011 Emergency Levy, LM secured \$10.6 million annually. These funds represent one-fifth of LM's total operating budget and are vital to the district's financial health. We are so thankful to the community for investing in the future of our students!

With careful planning and monitoring of the district's increasing growth in enrollment, the Board and LM administration will continue to provide the best opportunities available to our students in the most economical ways possible.

- In anticipation of growing energy demand and rate increases, LM locked in a four year rate for electricity.
- LM is paying approximately **50% less** than current market rates by locking in that price three years ago.

COMMITMENT TO COMMUNITY

It is the Little Miami way to help foster a sense of service and generosity in our students. To help cement this community-focused mentality, 12 hours of community service is required of all Seniors to graduate from LMHS. We are proud to share just a few ways students connect to their local community.

AMERICAN SIGN LANGUAGE

LMHS now has an ASL Class. ASL is North America's fastest-growing language. Ninety percent of deaf children are born to hearing parents, meaning most parents do not know how to communicate with their deaf children. Statistics show that deafness is on the rise. With roughly 20% of the USA population having some form of deafness/hearing loss, this is a perfect addition to LMHS course offerings.

SERVICE LEARNING





Little Miami High School Student Government annually plans and hosts a beautiful multi-district event specifically focused on ensuring students with special needs have the opportunity to attend a sensory-friendly prom with their peers. This incredible event allows all Warren County students to celebrate a milestone in their high school careers more relaxedly. Each honored guest is invited to have a student escort from their home school and all necessary adults needed to chaperone are also invited to attend.

A student-led project based class exploring different perspectives on issues working towards well rounded solutions. Students learn how to work in teams and develop life skills.

After researching social issues, students work towards solutions. In the past, students explored topics including mental health, education, hunger, senior, veteran and animal services.

LMPR VETERANS DAY PARADE/CELEBRATIONS

The Veterans Day Parade continues to bring large numbers of loved ones and cherished Veterans from the community to LM buildings. We are so proud that the parade is an event that will continue for years to come!



PURPLE STAR DESIGNATION

The Purple Star Award recognizes schools that show a major commitment to students and families connected to our nation's military. Since 2020, all school buildings within the Little Miami Local School District are recognized as Purple Star Designated Schools for their commitment to serving students and families connected to the United States armed forces.

Among the requirements a school must meet to receive the Purple Star Award is designating a liaison between military families in the district to ensure the families and students in the classrooms receive the special consideration they deserve.

Little Miami's application included information about Little Miami High School's unique Veterans Wall of Honor, annual elementary school observances of Veteran's Day and other military-focused activities and services around the district. The Purple Star designation is a 3-year designation. In April 2023, the Ohio Department of Education renewed all Little Miami school buildings as Purple Star Award-winning schools!



COMMITMENT TO COMMUNITY: SPOTLIGHT ON AIR FORCE JROTC

A unique feature of the LMHS and now LMMS community is the presence of the Air Force Junior Reserve Officers' Training Corps (AF JROTC) on our campuses. The AF JROTC class mission is to develop citizens of character dedicated to serving their nation and communities. JROTC students take on added responsibilities and tasks to learn leadership, planning, and service at an entirely different level. Little Miami is proud to be in the seventh year of offering this program to LM students.

WHY JOIN AF JROTC?

"We are a family," was a sentiment that seemed to resonate from a group of AF JROTC Seniors as they spoke on their years in the program. For those students on the fence about joining, Senior cadets encourage you to go for it! This commitment is fun, empowering, and not at all intimidating!

WHO WE ARE

This program, while supervised and guided by Lt. Col. Peterson and Chief Master Sergeant Becky Hale, is a cadet-run program.

During the 2023-24 school year, **135** cadets have chosen to participate in AF JROTC. **56** of those are 8th graders.



REQUIREMENTS & GRADUATION SEAL

Cadets must complete at least 2.5 hours of community service every quarter, wear a uniform on Wednesdays, dress and participate in physical fitness, and adhere to specific grooming standards when in uniform. You may have seen the Little Miami AF JROTC cadets presenting the flags at the YMCA on Veterans Day or a LM sporting event.

Cadets earn a seal for their diplomas upon graduation. If students enlist in the military after completing 3-4 years of AFJROTC, they will rank higher than entry-level cadets.

PROGRAM IMPACT

When polling Seniors in the JROTC program to reflect on their time as cadets, they offered great insight into just how the program has impacted their character development.

Seniors described their younger selves as shy, lacking confidence and even doubtful of their capabilities. They say that after joining the program, they were encouraged to come out of their shell and flourish in their leadership skills, even running classes and cadet units.





Aerospace Science Instructor, Chief Master Sergeant, Becky Hale

Chief Hale came to LM through an Air Force sponsored intern program last year. She is well liked by the cadets and the boundless energy she brings is inspiring.

Chief Hale retired from the Air Force in April of 2023.

While this program uses a military model in the classroom, it is not utilized for military recruiting.

There is no military requirement by participating in the AF JROTC program. In fact, only 3% of graduates choose to continue into the service upon graduating.

Fall 2021- After an extensive evaluation conducted by Region 7 Director for Headquarters Air Force JROTC, the LMHS unit earned the overall unit assessment score of "Exceeds Standard," the highest rating attainable!
