Happy Fall from the Library/Media Center!

A big aspect of my job is teaching keyboarding. I use a program called Type to Learn Cloud.

Students can log in to this program at home so they can further advance their skills at home, as well as at school. **Below you will find the home letter with our district's account code. Each student's username and password is their school lunch code.** If your student does not remember what their lunch code is, you can e-mail me, tcarmack@littlemiamischools.com or call me (513) 899-5200 x35410 and I will get that information to you.

Although I have posted this information on my Schoology page, I am concerned that many of you are unaware of how to join my group and what my access code is. Just for your information, my Schoology group is: Mrs. Carmack - library/Media HMP, access code 8PQ87-N9DHP.

Why teach keyboarding? Computing is a way of life today. Not only in school or in the workforce, but also as a means for communicating with others, sharing ideas, and expressing thoughts. The keyboard is the primary means of interfacing with a computer. Keyboarding is therefore an essential, 21st Century skill that students must develop in order to use computers effectively and efficiently. Even very young children are actively involved with using technology and computers on a regular basis. Research shows that keyboarding is and should be taught to students at an earlier age, before bad habits form. This early introduction reduces bad habit development and provides additional benefits that include improvements in spelling, writing, and reading comprehension. Student writing develops faster through word processing because it facilitates the review and revision process. Efficient keyboarding skills allow students to emphasize concept development instead of focusing on key location. Students who become efficient keyboarders "compose better, are prouder of their work, produce documents with a neater appearance, and have better motivation," (Nieman, 1996). Language arts skills are further developed by the lessons and activities in Type to Learn, which reinforce phonics, grammar, vocabulary, proper usage of punctuation, sight words, frequently misspelled words, and other elements of written language. Crosscurricular activity payoffs provide grade-appropriate incidental learning in science, literature, social studies, and other general knowledge topics. Mastering keyboarding involves learning technique (physical positioning and movement), ergonomics (safe and comfortable keyboard interaction), and key location. With Type to Learn, using the keyboard will become as natural to your students as writing with pen and paper. Its research-based, interactive learning environment will engage all K-12 keyboarding learners.

Accelerated Reader

Accelerated Reader is a computer program that helps teachers and librarians manage and monitor children's independent reading practice. Your child picks a book at his own level and reads it at his own pace. When finished, your child takes a short guiz on the computer.

Students at Maineville are earning charms for every 5 points they earn. Students earn points by reading books at their level and taking a computerized test about that book. At the end of each week, students who have earned 5 points are recognized for their reading success. Their names are announced over the intercom each week. Charms are in 5 point increments up to 100. After 100, charms are in 25 point increments.

In addition, classrooms earn points for rewards too. We have a school-wide contest each quarter. The class that earns the most points each quarter will get a pizza party! The next time you are at school, check out the Lego Board. Classes are putting up Legos as they earn points. We are truly building better readers!

The student's are very excited about this reading program! Ask your student about Accelerated Reader!

Physical Education – Mrs. Faucett

Our students are working hard with stretches and exercises this year. The 1st graders are constantly practicing loco-motor skills with an emphasis on personal space and different pathways. In both grades, we just finished our throwing unit. Emphasis was put on stepping with the opposite foot of the arm they throw with and stepping toward the target. We ended the unit with 8 stations that they rotated through. We will continue to throw throughout the year. At this age, they need to be moving 60 minutes every day.

We are getting ready to start working on ball handling skills and dribbling in basketball. We will also be starting a bowling unit. The students are beginning to demonstrate good sportsmanship without being told at the end of the activities and games. PLEASE make sure your child wears gym shoes (gym class is always the day after music class). Other shoes are unsafe and mark up the gym floor. They are welcome to bring their gym shoes to change into just for class.

Thank you for sharing your child with me! They make me proud every day and I love what I do!

Art Education - Mrs. Allen

First grade art students are just finishing their lesson on TEXTURE. We watched some fun videos about texture, went on a "feel trip" around the art room, and had a great discussion about the difference between actual texture and implied texture. We then made our own implied texture pictures by doing some crayon rubbings. We used those papers to make a collage of fall colored trees in the style of artist Eloise Renouf.

Second grade art students are currently working on a WARM/COOL COLOR project. We also watched some fun videos about warm and cool colors. We had a discussion about how warm and cool colors can represent actual temperatures as well as emotions. We discussed and looked at examples like Picasso's "Blue Period" and "Rose Period", as well how the animators at Disney/Pixar use color to show both actual temperature and emotions in movies like Frozen, Moana, and Inside Out.

Music Education – Mrs. Southwick

Our first grade music classes have been focusing on rhythms and rhythm patterns. They work toward becoming "Rhythm Masters" by the end of the month of October. Most of the classes have met this goal! As a special treat, we played the Conga drums along with a Star Wars play along. They had a lot of fun with this activity. We have also learned about echo's and call and responses within music.

The second grade music students have been very busy learning their music for the December concert. We incorporate all sorts of music terminology and techniques while learning this music. They have learned how to sing with their singing voices and not their speaking voices. They have learned about singing as one voice...this is called vocal blend. We are excited to show off our songs to you on Wednesday, December 6th. A letter will be coming home the beginning of November with details about this concert.



Science Education – Mrs. Hoffman

In science lab we are focusing on Forces and Motion.

The first graders are investigating push, pull, force, motion, gravity, solids, and liquids. They will be testing toy cars, catapults and roller coasters. We will be doing an investigation with popsicles and pancakes, and butter for solids and liquids. If your child has any severe allergies, please send me an email. I will also check with the school nurse before we do these labs.

The second grade is exploring with gravity, static electricity, magnets, and different kinds of forces. We will be using magnets, balloons, ramps, toy cars, and kites to explore forces and how things move. We will also be doing a lab making butter and pancakes. Please send me an email if your child has any severe allergies. The second grade is also learning a song to the tune of Frosty and Jingle bells to reinforce the concepts we are covering on forces and motion. It has been a very exciting year so far!
